

CDR Thomas P. Lawler is a native of Brooklyn, New York, and a 1967 graduate of Saint John's University.

CDR Lawler's initial assignment was with Patrol Squadron SIXTEEN at NAS Jacksonville. Flying the P-3A, B, and C model aircraft, he participated in deployments to Bermuda and Sigonella, as well as UNITAS XIII.

In June 1973 CDR Lawler reported to the Naval Air Development Center in Warminster, Pennsylvania where he served first as the Legal Officer then as P-3C Update I & II Test and Evaluation Officer. Selected for the Personnel Exchange Program (PEP) with the United Kingdom, he served an overseas tour with the Royal Air Force at Kinloss, Scotland. He was subsequently assigned to the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island.

CDR Lawler returned to Patrol Aviation in December 1979 through assignment to Patrol Squadron THIRTY at NAS Jacksonville, Florida. During this tour with the Fleet Replacement Training Squadron (VP-30), CDR Lawler served as the Operations Officer.

Reporting aboard Patrol Squadron FIVE (VP-5), in May 1981, he served as the Operations Officer, while making deployments to Sigonella. He returned to Patrol Squadron THIRTY (VP-30) in May 1983 as the Training Officer. CDR Lawler was selected for Patrol Aviation Command in October 1983.

CDR Lawler reported to Patrol Squadron FORTY-FIVE in August 1984 and assumed the duties of Commanding Officer on 10 January 1986.

CDR Lawler has been awarded the Meritorious Unit Commendation Medal, the Navy Expeditionary Medal, and National Defense Service Medal, and the Sea Service Ribbon.

CDR Lawler is married to the former Margaret Burke of Brooklyn, New York. They reside in Jacksonville with their two daughters, Jeanne and Megan.















Executive Officer CDR Robert L. Hume

CDR Robert L. Hume is a native of Memphis, Tennessee. He attended the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and graduated in 1967.

CDR Hume entered the Navy in 1968, serving in Vietnam aboard the USS JENNINGS COUNTY (LST-846). In February of 1970, he reported to Pensacola for AOCS and subsequent flight training. CDR Hume was designated a Naval Aviator in August 1971. His initial squadron tour was in Patrol Squadron FOUR at Barbers' Point, Hawaii where he made deployments to Cubi Point, Philippines and Kadena, Okinawa.

In May of 1975, CDR Hume reported to Fleet Replacement Squadron THIRTY-ONE where he qualified as an Instructor Pilot and was assigned successive duties as Legal Officer, Plans Officer and Standardization board member. Following this shore tour, CDR Hume participated in the Personnel Exchange Program and transferred to Patrol Squadron 405, Canadian Forces Base, Greenwood Nova Scotia in December 1977 where he qualified as Aircraft Commander and was ultimately assigned as Operations Officer.

CDR Hume reported to the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island in August 1980. In February 1982, CDR Hume reported aboard Patrol Squadron FIVE where he made several East Coast deployments and served as Maintenance Officer. He was reassigned to Commander, Patrol Wing ELEVEN in July 1984 where he served as Administrative Officer.

CDR Hume reported aboard Patrol Squadron FORTY-FIVE in December 1985 and assumed the duties of Executive Officer on January 10, 1986.

CDR Hume has received various awards highlighted by two Air Medals, the Combat Action Ribbon, the Presidential Unit Commendation, Navy Unit Commendation, Meritorious Unit Commendation and the Vietnam Service Medal.





How Come the Pelican?

Webster defines the pelican as any of the genus (Pelecanus) of large webfooted birds with very large bills, and distensible gular pouches in which fish are caught. He is basically a large water bird who inhabits most of the coastal waters of the world. He can be found in the tropics, as far south as the Antarctic Peninsula and as far north as the Arctic Circle. The Pelican is usually characterized as having a naked pouch on the underside of a hooked bill, a long heavy body, short stubby legs, and large webbed feet.

He is a strong, graceful flier and can stay aloft for hours in his search for food or when transiting from one roost to another. Some breeds are found far out at sea during the daylight hours, but always return to land at night to roost. Hunting technique varies among breeds. Some breeds hunt in large groups while swimming on the surface while others hunt as loners far out at sea. One technique which is probably the most interesting, and which most closely resembles the primary task of the VP maritime community is that of the North American Brown Pelican.

The Brown Pelican is a loner in his search for food, but once he localizes his prey, stand by for action. He will dive at the surface of the sea and smack it so violently that the fish will be stunned temporarily. He then easily scoops his helpless prey into his pouch.

Getting back to the title of this article, how come the Pelican? First, his physical features resemble the Orion aircraft in many aspects; the long heavy body, short stubby legs, and the strength of his wings. Second, the pelican species is a worldwide, land based coastal inhabitant, the same as the entire VP community. Finally he is a smooth, graceful aviator, yet he has the ability to maneuver himself quickly, effectively, and as in the case of the brown pelican, fiercely in his attack in a very effective manner.






