

#### William (Bill) G. Eaton



Commander William (Bill) G. Eaton, USN (Ret.) died on January 25, 2011 in Virginia Beach, VA. Born in Charleston, SC, March 26, 1922, he graduated from the Hamburg, NY, public school system in June 1940 and entered the US Navy where he won an appointment to the US Naval Academy. He graduated from the Naval Academy in June 1944 with the class of 1945.

In World War II he served as gunnery officer aboard the USS Blue, DD744, and USS Marshall, DD676. After a number of surface ship assignments he entered flight training and received his wings in September 1949 at Pensacola, FL. Additional Navy assignments included Patrol Squadrons VP21 in Patuxent River, MD, and VP45 in Coco Solo, Panama. Bill served in VP45 from 1954 to 1956; the NROTC Unit at the University of South Carolina in Columbia; the USN Postgraduate School in Monterey, CA, where he earned a Master's Degree in Physics; the CNO staff at the Pentagon; and the CINCLANTFLT staff in Norfolk, VA.

After retiring from the Navy in 1965, he worked for Northrop Corporation until 1972, where he proudly contributed to the first manned lunar landing. He then embarked on a twenty-five-year career teaching mathematics and science in the Norfolk and Virginia Beach public school systems and at Tidewater Community College.

Bill is survived by his wife of 66 years, Sally C. Eaton; his daughter, Isabel Pollard and husband Ken of Virginia Beach, and two sons, William and wife Ann of Virginia Beach and Robert and wife Marty Daly of Santa Fe, N.M.

Bill was a member of the USNA Alumni Association, of the VP21 and VP 45 Squadron Associations, and, for over 40 years, of Old Donation Episcopal Church in Virginia Beach.

# VP-45 Association to Commission Painting for Naval Aviation Museum


The VP-45 Association has commissioned Peter Wenman, a London based and highly regarded military aviation artist, to paint an original work of art depicting a VP-45 P-3 in peacetime action against a Soviet Juliett Class submarine. The scene will show a P-3C in 70's colors (complete with red dart) turning inbound on a surfaced Juliett with a carrier and a couple escort ships on a sunset horizon in the far background. The P-3 will be LN-9. This is a tribute to the Pelican aircraft LN-9 and the members of Crew 10 that were lost off Argentia Newfoundland in 1964.

The Association's intention is to donate the original oil artwork to the National Museum of Naval Aviation. The P-3 aircraft, which has helped protect America for nearly 50 years, and all the officers and men who flew this magnificent bird are sorely under-represented among the displays at the Museum. This donation should change that in a small but important way.

One of our members, Bill Hobgood (VP-45 '71 - '74), came up with the idea for the original painting and the donation to the Museum in

Pensacola. After working closely with the artist, he determined that if the VP-45 Association could market a smaller signed, numbered and limited edition print of the original art (likely an edition of about 125 - 150 prints) and sell enough in advance, the revenue from print sales would cover the cost of the original. The original art will be 36" x 18" and the hand signed and numbered prints will be 28" x 14" limited edition print (30" x 17" with borders). Cost of the print is \$95.00 (which includes shipping).




### **VP-45 Donation and Bench**

#### **Tour possibilities:**

#### **NATIONAL MUSEUM OF AVIATION AT NAS PENSACOLA (6-7 hours)**

This is one of the largest aviation museums in the world and one of Florida's *Top 10* attractions. With more than 170 vintage aircraft this 300,000 square foot wonder chronicles more than nine decades of naval aviation. This is a self-paced tour of 2 full museum floors and the historic flight line outside the museum. You may also see a spectacular *IMAX* film on the famous *Blue Angels*, which are headquartered here. Shown on a 60-foot high screen this feature will surely give you goose bumps! (Note: IMAX is optional and not included in price – pay on your own if interested)

\*\*Government issued photo identification (ex. ID card or drivers license) is required to visit NAS Pensacola

#### **MOBILE CITY TOUR & FORT CONDE (4-5 hours)**

Mobile is 300 years old and you can imagine all the fascinating sites to see and stories to hear about this historic city. Your tour will showcase the history and the unique blend of architecture with the magnificent antebellum homes of Federal, Greek revival, and Victorian styles. You will travel down the lovely streets of the garden district, which are framed with gigantic Live Oaks forming a beautiful canopy of trees. You will then visit Fort Condé; a partially reconstructed French fort, which protected Mobile and its citizens for nearly 100 years from 1723-1820. The Fort was built by the French as a defense against British and Spanish attack on the strategic location of Mobile and its Bay, the eastern most part of the Louisiana colony. The military importance of Mobile and Fort Condé was huge. The fort and town protected access into the strategic lands between the Mississippi River and the Atlantic colonies along the Alabama and Tombigbee Rivers. Note- this old fort is not fully wheelchair accessible.

#### MOBILE CITY & HISTORIC HOUSE TOUR 4-5 hours)

Mobile is 300 years old and you can imagine all the fascinating sites to see and stories to hear about this historic city. Your tour will showcase the history and the unique blend of architecture with the magnificent antebellum homes of Federal, Greek revival, and Victorian styles. You will travel down the lovely streets of the garden district, which are framed with gigantic live oaks forming a beautiful canopy of trees. Following the guided tour, you can have lunch on your own, at one of the restaurants downtown before proceeding to the *Richard DAR* House. This home, built in 1860, is one of Mobile's finest examples of the Italianate style and famous for its cast-iron facade depicting the four seasons. On the National Register of Historic Homes, the lavish iron lace decorates this *Richards – Daughters of the American Revolution House Museum*. This beautiful town house of the Italianate style tells the story of Mobile during its antebellum period. Here, you will enjoy a guided tour followed by a tea and then time to visit the very unique gift shop.

#### USS ALABAMA TOUR (4-5 hours)

You will spend the morning at *Battleship Memorial Park* exploring the Battleship USS Alabama, the recipient of nine WWII Battle Stars. The *USS Alabama* and her crew of 2,500 saw action in the Atlantic for a year before joining the Pacific Fleet in mid-1943. There she fought at such key locations at Leyte, the Gilbert Islands and Okinawa. After the signing of the war-ending surrender documents in September 1945, USS Alabama, or the "Mighty A", as she was known, led the American Fleet into Tokyo Bay. You will have plenty of time to explore *Battleship Memorial Park* at your own pace. Don't miss the USS Drum, Vietnam and Korean War Memorials, many tanks, artillery, patrol boats and spy planes.

#### **BELLINGRATH HOME & GARDEN TOUR (5 hours)**

Nowhere in the world is floral beauty more concentrated than in the internationally famous *Bellingrath* Gardens. Located on the riverfront land once trod by French and Spanish Colonials, this "Garden Spot of the South" is a floral wonderland. Located on the grounds is the home of *Coca Cola* magnate, Walter D. Bellingrath. The home is furnished with antique furniture in period settings, plus the world's largest collection of *Boehm* china and porcelain acquired by Mrs. Bellingrath. The world's most complete public display of porcelain sculptures of the late Edward Marshall Boehm is in the Garden Museum. Your visit will begin with a short video that will show the Gardens in all seasons, you will then enjoy a tour of the house, followed by a tour of the Gardens. Flowers in bloom during this time of year are hydrangeas, salvia, marigolds, alyssum, dahlias, Mexican heather, pansies, fuchsia baskets and geraniums.

## **CDR Paul Ditch, USN**

Commander Paul Ditch, a native of Lafayette Louisiana, enlisted in the Navy in 1987. As a first tour Aviation Antisubmarine Warfare Operator (NAC/RS), he was stationed at the ASW Operatinos Center, Roosevelt Roads Puerto Rico and as an instructor at HSL-41 at NAS North Island. Earning his Bachelors Degree in Business Management from the Universoty of LaVerne in 1993, he was commissioned as an Ensign from Aviation Officer Candidate School. He earned his Naval Flight Officer Wings of Gold in 1994.

Following Fleet Replacement Squadron Traning at Patrol Squadorn THIRTY (VP-30) he was assigned to Patrol Squadron FORTY, located at NAS Whidbey Island from September 1995 to August 1999. He attained qualificatinos as Patrol Plane Tactical Coordinator, Mission Commander, and Instructor Tactical Coordinator. While serving as NFO NATOPS Officer and Assistant Training Officer, he participated in deployments to Diego garcia where he flew in suport of Operation Southern Watch operting out of Masirah Oman, Jeddah Saudi Arabia and Bahrain. He also completed two deployments to Misawa AB, Japan, and Kadena AB, Okinawa Japan.

In September 1999 Commander Ditch reported to Patrol, Sqaudron THIRTY, NAS Jacksonville, Florida. He served as FRS Instructor TACCO, Mission Commander, Fleet IUT facilitator, Fleet NATOPS NFO and Fleet NATOPS Division Officer.

In November 2002, he reported to the USS John F. Kennedy (CV-67) serving as the Assistant Strike Operations Officer. He participated in every facet of Strike Group planning and attained the qualification of Officer of the Deck Underway.

Upon deprting, Commander Ditch waas selected to attend the Air Command and Staff College at Maxwell AFB, Montgomery, Alabama where upon graduation in June 2005 he obtained his Master of Arts degree in Military Arts and Operational Science.



Commander Ditch returned to maritime Patrol Aviatoin in September 2005 for his Deprtment Head tour joining the Screaming Eagles of Patrol Squadron ONE in Whidbey Island, Washington. He served as Tactics Officer, Training Officer and Ooperations Officer completing a challenging Tri-Site deployment in support of Operation Enduring Freedom Philippines.

After completion of duties with Patrol Squaron ONE, Commander Ditch reported to the Joint Warfare Analysis Center, Dahlgren, Virginia where he served as Combatant Command Liaison Officer. In 2008 he completed a 5month tour in Iraq serving on the planning staffs for Multi-Natinoal Corps Iraq and Multi-Natinoal Force Iraq.

Commander Ditch reported to the Pelicans of Patrol Squadron FOUR FIVE as Exceutive Officer in May of 2010, becoming Commandg Officer in May 2011.



## **Commanding Master Chief, Patrol Squadron Forty-Five**


#### **Master Chief Paul Alcott**

Duty assignments include: USS Alamogordo (ARDM 2), USS Illusive (MSO 448), USS Halyburton (FFG 40), Naval Recruiting District Jacksonville Fl, Naval Recruiting District Miami Fl, serving as Recruiter in Charge (large station) and assistant Zone Supervisor and Zone Trainer. He then reported for duty to USS Jack Williams (FFG-24). His next assignment was onboard USS Nashville (LPD-13) as Deck Department's LCPO and Well Deck Control Officer. Next transfer was to Broadened Opportunity for Officer Selection and Training (BOOST), Naval Education and Training Center, Newport, RI as the Senior Enlisted Advisor. While assigned to Newport he was advanced to Master Chief and attended the Senior Enlisted Academy. # 100th Anniversary of Naval Aviation and Patrol Aviation Send Celebration

"Greetings fellow Patrol Squadron members.

I just came back from the Centennial celebration of Naval Aviation and especially observing Patrol Aviation in Jacksonville, Florida. It was April 4-6, 2011. I'm going to recap for you the briefing we received on Wednesday from Rear Admiral Michael Hewitt, Commander Patrol and Recon. Force. He welcomed us to the event. We then listened to a simulated briefing for a crew to fly against a Chinese Yuan class sub. The sub is a diesel-electric boat. It was first built in 2004. The speed of the sub is 20 kts. It has 6 torpedo tubes and can fire anti-ship missiles. The op area for this event is East of Taiwan.

The briefing was then turned over to Commodore Tray Wheeler, CPW 11 in Jax. The breakdown of the Patrol Aviation community starts with ADM Hewitt as the Commander of the force. Under him are CPW 2, CPW 10 and CPW 11. Now there is an ADM commanding the op areas. Under that ADM are CTF 57, CTF 72 and CTF 67.

At one point there were 450 P-3s and now we are down to approximately 85 mission capable aircraft. A couple of years ago there were issues with the wings and some planes were "red striped", in other words hard down. The fleet got down to 49 aircraft. The planes are owned by the squadrons, but they are sharing their planes between squadrons. Sometimes they might leave a plane on deployment for the next squadron. Reserve crews fly alongside of active duty crews in the active duty squadrons. They share Active Duty assets. There are 18 squadrons with 7273 sailors: 1346 officers and 5927 enlisted.

Commodore Dave Cutter from Wing 2 spoke next. VP-4 is very busy with the Chinese Navy and also providing relief in Japan. Other squadrons in Kaneohe are VP-9 and VP-47. Plus there is VPU-2. There is an ASWOC located in San Diego to assist squadrons working with the

fleet. There has been a BAMS-D (Demonstrator) working in the Pacific for awhile now. This is a Global Hawk UAV with maritime sensors= cameras, radar, and comm. gear for the Navy. It operates at 60,000 ft and has an endurance of over 20+ hours. The pilots fly it from the "desert" and the tacco and sensor operators are in Pax. River. Usually there are 3 different crews on duty during these long missions.

Commodore Pete Garvin from Wing 10 spoke next. The squadrons at Whidbey Is. are VP-1, VP-40, VP-46, and VP-69. Also there is VQ 1&2. VQ is deployed 365 days a year to Bahrain, Kadena, Sigonella Sicily, and Turkey.

Commodore Wheeler then spoke again. He said he had VP-5, VP-8, VP-10, VP-16, VP-26, VP-45, and VP-62, plus the special ops squadron VPU-1 in Jax. VP squadrons 8, 10 and 26 were at Brunswick before it closed.

There are 24 different variations of the P-3 today. One version is the AIP. The improvements are: Radar, SAR (overland surveillance and radar images), ISAR (maritime surface detection images). Electro Optics/Infrared, ESM, Color Displays and Weapons- SLAM ER and Maverick. The VP-5 crew that fired the Maverick off Libya had a LTJG TACCO and the PPC was on his first flight. They said they hope to de-classify the video so we could see it someday. Presently VP-4 is in Kadena and Misawa. VP-5 is in Sigonella Sicily, Djibouti, and El Salvador (drug ops). VP-8 is currently in Bahrain and Qatar. The primary

mission of the P-3 is still ASW. China has 66 submarines and the U.S. has 70 submarines. China has top of the line equipment and the subs are quiet.

If there is a piracy event, the Navy's interaction will have a P-3 overhead. In drug interdiction the bad guys have tried using semi-submersible and fully submersible subs to get drugs to the U.S. The Russians are still operating. They don't have a big presence like before, but they are out there. The Chinese are now considered a Blue Water Navy. They are operating beyond the "first chain of islands". That would be from Taiwan to Okinawa to Japan and East of that line.

The project manager of the P-8 spoke next. The Navy is buying 117 aircraft. It is a Boeing 737-800 with a -900 wing. It will weigh 187,700 lbs. It will cruise at 490 kts and max alt is 41,000 ft. Its range is 4000 miles or 1200 miles with 4 hrs on station. It has in-flight refueling capacity. The P-8 is fuel efficient at 10,000 ft, but not so good at low altitudes. There is technology to launch sonos at 10,000 ft to hit a lat/long position. The flight time is limited to 17 hrs due to the engine oil. It will have 9 crewmembers= 2 pilots, 2 NFOs and 3 AWs. Plus there are 2 observer positions. There are 5 stations in the back, and all capable of inter-mixing these positions (tacco in the middle or at the ends). The plane is capable of carrying 20 total pax. It can carry 5 MK 54 torpedoes in the bomb-bay behind the wings. There are 4 wing stations. It can carry 76 sonobuoys. They will be launched from 3 cylinders. They will be reloaded from the sono racks in flt. The cabin will remain pressurized. There is no MAD on this plane, too much metal interference. There might be an expendable drone the size of a buoy and be shot out of the plane and then fly a mad trapping pattern. This might happen in 2016. There are dual navigation systems. INS and also celestial info could be fed into the nav system. The plane will come on line in 2013 and one Jax squadron will be the first. It has early warning self-protection and electric support measures. The plane that was at the event was the 3rd (T-3) built. There are 6 planes in flight testing. The first production plane for the Navy is in Renton, WA going through the production line. There will be 6 aircraft and 12 crews in P-8 squadrons.

The events for the 3 days were; on day 1 there was a tour of the P-3 simulators, the new hanger which will house the current squadrons

and future P-8s. They can fit 10 P-3s in the hanger. Then in the afternoon was the fly-by. There was vintage aircraft; stearman and TBM. Then there was a T34C, C-12, and T44C. Then came 3 P-3s. The first was painted in WW II PBY markings. The next 2 were in the white and black colors. Then the highlight was the arrival of the P-8. Unfortunately the PBY was not able to attend (maint, issues). They looked into bringing in a fire bomber P-2, but they wanted a lot of money and it exceeded the budget of the planners for this event. On Tues night was the heritage dinner. Vice Admiral Al Myers, Commander of Naval Air Force (Air Boss) was the guest speaker. There were 17 Admirals in attendance. The 3 P-3s the P-8 and the BAMS were parked outside the hanger for viewing. Then we had the induction of the first group into the Patrol Aviation Hall of Fame. One familiar name is Jay Beasley, "Mr. P-3". ADM Hewitt said he would like to make this an annual event. On Wed morning we had the briefing from ADM Hewitt and the Commodores. In the afternoon, we attended the re-dedication of the PBY on the base. It took 2 years to restore the plane. There were 4 crewmembers from WW II who were on the PBY present at the dedication.

Most of the video is of the heritage dinner and dedication of the PBY, not to mention some P-3s flying. I have attached a copy of the heritage dinner program.

It was a great time being in attendance for this event. During the dinner, they showed a video of the early years of Naval Aviation and then covered the Patrol Aviation era up to the present. There was a copy of VP-4's P-2 "Ruler of the Sea" print hanging right outside the auditorium at VP-30. There were only 2 other prints on the wall; a PBY and P3B. Being at the VP-30 hanger brought back memories of hearing the sound of an APU, and the Allison engines running. Not to mention the smell of JP. It was an honor being around some our nation's finest young people who are now carrying on the mission of defending this great nation."
